According to the syllabus, number of classes for each topic is decided and credit assigned to each topic/group/paper etc. 3.College administration provides a well-constructed weekly time table for each semester for both UG and PG classes. 4. Classes are held according to the schedule under the supervision of college administration. 5. Teachers prepare their lectures according to the syllabus allotted and classes available. 6. Various classroom teaching methods based on various needs of different subjects are regularly used for the effective delivery of the curriculum such as- a) ICT-enabled teaching-learning method. b) Use of different software. c) Use of Scientific models and charts for effective lecture delivery. d) Distribution of class notes by teachers. e) Group discussion amongst the students during the class. f) Seminars by students related to curriculum. g) Paper presentation by the students. h) Proper and adequate instrumentation facility is given to the students for their practical classes. i) Project work, dissertations are conducted for fulfilment of their degrees. j) Regular internal assessment unit test in particular semester to keep track on the improvement of the students.

The college has since last thirty six years practiced the system of mentoring called the tutor ward system where by tutor was provided to every ward to look after his /her academic and psychological wellbeing and also monitor class attendance and performance. The same system has now has been restructured and named mentor system. Under the mentor system the full time teachers of the college have been engaged as mentor of each class. Students of each class in the college are having a full time teacher as their mentor. The classes where there are huge numbers of students have been organised more than one mentor at the beginning of the academic session. The class wise names of the mentors are displaced on the college website. The mentors are responsible for academic process and psychological wellbeing of their mentees. They are also entrusted with the task of monitoring the attendance and academic progress of the students. They also provide Psychological counselling to those who need them and refer them for more professional counselling if required at the beginning of the session. The mentors conduct orientation programmes for mentees whereby they are acquainted with the institution its goals and mission, the facilities available and the regulations of the affiliating University. The

mentors maintain the biographic details of each individual mentee including educational background and socioeconomic status they also maintain record of their class attendance, class performance and academic progress. The mentors used both formal and informal means of mentoring the mentor system apart from its formal part also exist as a robust informal mechanism to boost inclusiveness gender sensitivity and social responsibility of students
