The college has since last thirty six years practiced the system of mentoring called the tutor ward system whereby tutor was provided to every ward to look after his /her academic and psychological wellbeing and also monitor class attendance and performance. The same system has now has been restructured and named mentor system. Under the mentor system the full time teachers of the college have been engaged as mentor of each class. Students of each class in the college are having a full time teacher as their mentor. The classes where there are huge numbers of students have been organised more than one mentor at the beginning of the academic session. The class wise names of the mentors are displaced on the college website. The mentors are responsible for academic process and psychological wellbeing of their mentees. They are also entrusted with the task of monitoring the attendance and academic progress of the students. They also provide Psychological counselling to those who need them and refer them for more professional counselling if required at the beginning of the session. The mentors conduct orientation programmes for mentees whereby they are acquainted with the institution its goals and mission, the facilities available and the regulations of the affiliating University. The mentors maintain the biographic details of each individual mentee including educational background and socioeconomic status they also maintain record of their class attendance, class performance and academic progress. The mentors used both formal and informal means of mentoring the mentor system apart from its formal part also exist as a robust informal mechanism to boost inclusiveness gender sensitivity and social responsibility of students.

Moreover, the college has begun the consideration of taking the class tests under newly introduced CBCS system through OMR sheets from the coming years.
